Not long after our move to Caulfield South, the first example of the benefits of having an integrated precinct occurred when a long-term Community Palliative patient was accepted as a resident into Huntly suites when it became apparent that his care needs were such that he would not be able to remain at home. We now have two such residents in the Huntly Suites. The experience represents the vision of Calvary

Pet Therapy dogs bring joy to patients and residents alike at Calvary Kooyong



The Calvary Pet Therapy program has expanded and now extends to the Residential Aged Care Suites and the Hyson Retirement Apartments.

Pet Therapy dogs play a vital role at Calvary Kooyong providing comfort, companionship and emotional support for patients and residents. From improving motivation and moods to bringing people together, visiting pets play an important role providing unconditional affection to those in need. It is incredible to witness how the mood picks up in the building when the therapy dog volunteer group come to visit.

Led by Terry Lack, who is president of the Bayside Companion Training School, the group consists of Terry's rottweller Ruby, Anne and her poodle Evie, Keith and his Sheep Dog cross Charley Girl and Jenny and her Labrador Lizzie. With regular visits to the Bethlehem Hospital wing and Huntly Suites for aged care residents, they all make note of how life-changing their experiences have been.

"All we do is walk around the precinct to visit as many people as we can, allowing them to pat and cuddle the dogs," Terry says. "It sounds like such a simple thing, but it provides both patients and residents with the opportunity to develop a deeper, emotional connection with the animals."

Helen Sheedy, a patient of our Bethlehem Hospital, has developed a particularly beautiful relationship with Ruby.

Only diagnosed with Motor Neurone Disease (MND) 6 weeks previously, Helen's experience with therapy dogs has been unforgettable. "A visit really cheers me up. It's so therapeutic for someone like me who spends a lot of time in bed," she says.

Apart from many other talents he posseses, Volunteer David Schrapel is also our games master. The keen photographer has started up a games group at Calvary Kooyong Hyson apartments, introducing residents to the game of Sequence, and visits patients on the sub-acute ward at Calvary Bethlehem

to offer company and a welcome distraction over a game of any type - board, card or adventure. He also has an extensive personal games library which he dives into to add to the excitement.

The Knit and Natter program at Calvary Kooyong's Hyson Apartments started as a socialisation exercise for residents of the retirement Apartments a few months ago. The program recognises the benefit of gathering around a purpose.

At the same time the volunteer Service at Calvary Kooyong was looking for assistance with a rug project that some volunteers were already involved with.

A conversation between the Volunteer Coordinator and the Apartment manager resulted in the two projects coming together in "knit and natter" a knitting for a purpose exercise which is held every Wednesday from 10am– 12 noon on the Skydeck of the Hyson Apartments that overlooks Caulfield South back to the city.

Every week residents gather at Hyson, crocheting, joining, then knitting and sorting and finally packing the finished rugs which are then shared with Community palliative patients and aged care residents in need. On any given day each of the ladies might be involved in each of the different stages of production.

Volunteer Sophia who helps facilitate the program and who crochets panels at home to help build the rugs is thoroughly enjoying the experience. "The sessions are working out really well" she says. "Some of the women here didn't know each other very well before they started and now they are friends".

Catching up also allows the women to share information about their weeks and issues they are facing in their new lives.

Resident Judy used to knit as a young girl but not since and freely admits that she is learning all over again but is relishing the experience and the opportunity to reminisce with her new friends.

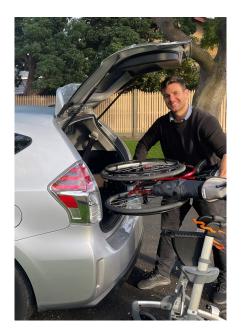
Bethlehem Physio wins National 'Emerging Researcher' Award
